Key Staff	
Head of Post 16: Mr M. West Mrs L. Heartfield	Mr West and Mrs Heartfield have responsibility for student development and achievement throughout the sixth form. They work closely with the sixth form staff, tutors, teachers, students and parents to ensure appropriate guidance, curriculum and opportunities are available for all students. It is the responsibility of Mr West and Mrs Heartfield to track and monitor all aspects of your progress throughout your time in Sixth Form, both academically and holistically as young adults. They will also ensure that you are supported to develop and implement a plan to support your Post 18 progression, whether that be in accessing Higher Education, an apprenticeship or employment. Mrs Heartfield is also the Designated Safeguarding Lead for Sixth Form students at Quarrydale and will be the person who works with students, their families and other agencies if concerns arise.
Tutor Team	One of the most important people you will meet in the Sixth Form is your tutor. Everyone is part of a tutor group and your tutor will be your first line of contact throughout your time in the Sixth Form. He/she will get to know you as soon as possible and review your progress on a regular basis. Do your best to really get to know this person and make good use of the contact that you will be having. Tutors will arrange individual meetings with every member of their tutor group on a half termly basis to review progress, consider future plans and to discuss any other general issues.
Other Support	During your time in Post 16 there will be lots of opportunities to be involved in extracurricular activities. Students lead the Sixth Form Social Committee, who are responsible for arranging a wide variety of events for Sixth Form students to be a part of. These include sporting events, fundraisers, performances and social events to name but a few. The Social Committee also provides students the opportunity to give their views and voice any concerns regarding Sixth Form through designated student representatives. All students have the opportunity to be a part of the committee and more information will be provided in the first few weeks of the school year. For those of you interested in completing an Extended Project Qualification during your time in Sixth Form, help will be at hand to support and guide you through this process. More information about the EPQ will be provided once you have settled in to your new study routines. Students wishing to develop and extend their independent learning skills, research skills and report writing skills to improve their extended writing for longer mark questions and coursework (often required in A Level exams), will also have the opportunity to access support in doing so.

Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form Expectations

As a student at Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form you are expected to:

- Develop independent learning skills and a strong work ethic, taking personal responsibility for your own learning and organising yourself accordingly, ensuring you have the correct equipment and resources
- Take responsibility for your personal progress and your future beyond Quarrydale.
- Have individual aspirations and use the help available to achieve these.
- Maintain progress towards your goals and target grades, maintaining effort and commitment to all of your courses
- Attend all exams for which you are entered
- Attend extracurricular sessions and activities that will help with your development and progression (including UCAS sessions, university open days, workshops, skill development sessions and work experience and trips, where appropriate).
- Maintain a good punctuality and attendance record, Attend on a full time basis and arrive punctually to all registration periods and lessons. The school day starts at 8.35am and ends at 3pm. You must notify Sixth Form of any absences.
- Complete all homework, coursework and assignment tasks within the deadlines set by the subject teachers
- Carry out wider reading and independent study for every subject over and above set homework.
- Behave in a manner which causes no offence or danger to other students or to members of staff. You are role models within the school and should act in a way that reflects this.
- Dress in an appropriate manner in accordance with the dress code
- Contribute positively and purposefully to your Sixth Form experience and to our community.
- Access the Sixth Form team if you have any problems or need extra support, we are here to help.

As a student at Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form you can expect:

- High standards of teaching across all subjects in all lessons.
- The support of staff in all areas of Post 16 life, academic, pastoral and extracurricular.
- Support and guidance to help to make decisions regarding your future beyond Post 16.
- Staff to be approachable and willing to listen to any issues or concerns you may have.
- To be provided with opportunities to take part in extracurricular activities that help develop skills and knowledge essential for your progression beyond Quarrydale. #

The expectations detailed above are the basis of the learner agreements that are signed by all students and their parents/carers at the beginning of each academic year.

A Typical Week	<p>All students will be required to study at least three Level three subjects, with some opting to study four. These can be A Levels, Level Three Btecs or a combination of both. Some students may also be required to re-sit GCSE English and/or Maths if they did not achieve the required Grade 4.</p> <p>Sixth Form is run on a fortnightly timetable (Week A and Week B) with 5 x 60 minute lessons each day.</p> <p>Your timetable will be comprised of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Up to 8 lessons per fortnight per subject for A Level subjects • Up to 8 lessons per fortnight per subject for Level Three Btec subjects • Up to 4 lessons per subject per fortnight for GCSE English and Maths resits <p>All students are allocated to a tutor group comprised of year 12 and year 13 students. There will be a registration period every morning from 8.35am-8.45am and an afternoon registration period from 12.40pm-12.55pm which you must attend. This time is crucial as it is during these sessions that we share key information and messages and hand out any documents and letters that need to go home to parents/carers.</p> <p>Your tutor will also support you by providing information and guidance on the choices and decisions which you will be making relating to applications for university, apprenticeships or employment opportunities, and will meet with you on a one to one basis at least once every half term to monitor your progress and discuss any concerns you may have. Registration is also an ideal time for year 12 students to speak to year 13 students and gain advice and guidance from those who have recently been in the same position.</p> <p>There will be additional compulsory periods known as Alternative Learning Periods, where Enrichment and Personal Development will be undertaken by all students. Every student has three alternative learning periods a fortnight allocated to them and these appear on every students timetable. These periods are mandatory, but students are able to choose the activities they undertake to ensure they are beneficial to their progress and development; details of these activities can be found at the back of the handbook.</p> <p>PSHE is also compulsory and will take place every Friday during period One. PSHE will cover a variety of areas throughout your time in sixth form ranging from academic tutoring, careers advice, financial awareness and university and work applications, as well as personal, social and emotional development. You will also have the opportunity to achieve additional qualifications such as The Extended Project at other times during the week.</p>
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	<p>In addition to the 'taught' part of your timetable, there will be additional opportunities to participate in 'enrichment' activities'. More details of the wide variety of opportunities on offer will be highlighted during your time in the sixth form (e.g. reading pairs, lesson support, peer mentoring, social committee, charity work, work experience, volunteering, mooks). Many higher education courses and employers expect students to have sought relevant experience in their chosen area during their time in sixth form (e.g. teaching, nursing and medical applications).</p> <p>Your timetable will also have periods of non-contact time which should be used in a productive way. Study periods should be used to carry out independent study, research, completing assignments and practising practical elements of courses, as well as to complete enrichment activities and getting to know new faces and making new friends.</p> <p>At no point during lesson times should students be playing games outside the sixth form area. This not only disrupts lessons elsewhere but also goes against appropriate use of independent study time.</p>
The Common Room and Study Spaces	<p>Downstairs in Sixth Form is the common room, which is a facility provided for you and it should be treated respectfully with any litter placed into the bins provided and furniture left tidily. The common room is an area for socialising but also an area for students to work in, so please be respectful of your fellow students when spending time in here.</p> <p>The upstairs area of Sixth Form is designated study space and noise should be kept to a minimum. The upstairs open area is to be used for work and studying at all times during lesson time, if you are taking a break from studying and wish to socialise with your friends, please ensure you use the downstairs common room.</p> <p>Please respect the zonal system that is in place throughout the Sixth Form. Red zones are for silent study, Amber Zones are study spaces where an appropriate level of discussion can take place and Green Zones are for socialising.</p>
The Dress Code	<p>In the sixth form you will be expected to dress sensibly and in a respectful manner, maintaining a smart and appropriate appearance that would be acceptable to staff and pupils.</p> <p>Accepted Dress:</p>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Trousers or skirt of an appropriate length. • Tailored shorts of an appropriate length • Shirt, polo shirt or blouse • Dresses of an appropriate length and style. • Sweater, jumper or cardigan • Suit/or jacket and tie (optional) • Appropriate shoes. <p>Unaccepted Dress:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ripped jeans • Sportswear, including tops/Sweatshirts/Jogging Bottoms/Tracksuits (unless required for a Sport or Dance lesson). • Caps or hats inside the school building. • No 'strappy' or cropped tops • Beachwear • Any items of clothing featuring inappropriate logos or slogans. <p>If your standard of dress is deemed to be outside of our expectations your tutor will speak to you about this, repeated breaches of the dress code will result in a formal meeting.</p> <p>All students should clearly have their lanyards visible at all times whilst on site.</p> <p>It is crucial on Health & Safety and safeguarding grounds that all students are easily identifiable.</p>
Advice and Guidance for Post 18 Progression	<p>During the Enrichment/PSHE/Tutor sessions, all students are involved in a range of activities and workshops that will provide advice and guidance on all aspects of Post 18 progression, including Higher Education, Apprenticeships and Employment. The purpose of these sessions is to enable you to make informed decisions and to support you in a successful transfer to life beyond Sixth Form education.</p> <p>There will also be workshops and sessions which focus on the development of transferrable skills, such as interview skills, developing communication skills and presentation skills. These skills will be imperative in your future endeavours and will help you to develop in a holistic way.</p> <p>There are many resources available to students. A range of talks covering specific areas, such as applications, CVs, interviews, specialist careers etc. will be given throughout the year.</p>

	<p>Information will also be available from the Post 16 team, who are always on hand to answer any questions you may have.</p>
16-19 Bursary	<p>The 16-19 Bursary fund is designed to help support those young people who face the greatest barriers to continuing in education or training, post-16.</p> <p>The fund has two elements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bursaries for vulnerable young persons, such as those in care (Vulnerable bursary) • Discretionary bursaries for young people facing financial barriers to participation in education, such as those entitled to Free School Meals or with a low household income (Discretionary Bursary). <p>Bursary funds are to be used to help pay for costs such as: transport, meals, books and equipment and are paid directly into the student's bank account on a weekly payment. Payments will only be made to students who adhere to the expectations of Sixth Form and will be withheld if there are any issues with punctuality, attendance, behaviours and the completion of work.</p> <p>A briefing will be held for students on the first day of term.</p> <p>Further information regarding eligibility criteria and application forms are available from Mrs Heartfield.</p>
Alternative Learning-Enrichment and Personal Development	<p>Sixth Form is not only about getting academic qualifications. Students need to be prepared to enter the realm of Higher Education and employment and need to develop skills that equip them to do so successfully. These skills include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Communication • Problem solving • Presentation Skills • Organisation • Management and Leadership • Citizenship • Resilience • Confidence • Initiative • Teamwork <p>There will be a range of opportunities available that help to develop transferable skills and holistic development (More details can be found at the back of this handbook). As part of the journey through the 6th form it is important that students not only engage and succeed in their academic studies, but also important that they develop holistic skills that will make them a well-rounded member</p>

	<p>of society; giving them the best chance to succeed in whatever route they take after the 6th form.</p>
PSHE/SMSC	<p>All students in years 12 and 13 will take part in PSHE/RSE lessons once a week, as well as additional time in tutor to cover topics further when required.</p> <p>PSHE: Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education will be covered in a variety of programmes and activities for all students in Post 16, focussing on the development of knowledge, skills and attributes to keep our students safe, healthy and prepared for the wider world beyond Quarrydale. Details of the PSHE programme can be found on the Academy website. All students in Post 16 will follow a programme that covers the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Health and Wellbeing • Mental Health • Financial Education • British Values • Citizenship • Relationships and Sex Education • Drugs Education • Careers • Post 18 progression • Study Skills • Employability <p>SMSC: Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development is the overarching umbrella that encompasses personal development across the whole curriculum. This will be embedded within the Post 16 curriculum at Quarrydale.</p>
Mobile Phones/Laptops/ Tablets	<p>When in the communal areas of the Sixth Form building, students are permitted to use their mobile phones, however, they must not be in use when in the main school building and walking through corridors. They should not be used in lessons/registration periods or workshops/extracurricular sessions you are involved in, unless a member of staff has given permission for this to happen. This also applies to headphones/earphones of any kind. If a student does not adhere to this rule, staff may confiscate items from students in accordance with the whole school mobile phone policy.</p>

	<p>We have a range of IT facilities available for students to use, which are all located in the Sixth Form building and are accessible to students at all times.</p> <p>Students may also bring their own laptops/tablets in to school and will be able to connect to the school Wi-Fi system- Details of how to do this will be provided.</p>
Procedures	
Attendance	<p>Full and punctual attendance to lessons and registration is required of all students and failure to comply with the Sixth Form expectations regarding this will be taken seriously. Students register in morning and afternoon registration periods and in every lesson they attend.</p> <p>Every request for a reference that we receive, whether for part time jobs or full time careers, asks us to comment on your record in this regard. Our systems are very precise and enable us to add your exact percentage attendance to references. Potential employers and Higher Education institutions take a very dim view of poor attendance.</p> <p>All absences must be explained. Any foreseeable absence, such as medical appointments, interviews etc., should be notified in advance by emailing the post16 attendance email group (post16attendance@quarrydale.notts.sch.uk) and when possible, your tutor. Any absences due to illness or unforeseen circumstances should also be explained by email to the attendance email group and your tutor on the day these occur.</p> <p>Please note that driving lessons should not be arranged during school time.</p> <p>Should you be absent for any reason, students are expected to liaise with teachers directly or via email, in order to obtain and catch up on work missed. In some instances, it may be appropriate for us to send work home where absence may be prolonged.</p> <p>Consistent absences from specific subjects will be dealt with by departmental and sixth form staff, and may result in the setting of additional deadlines and targets and a review of subject suitability. If no improvement is made it will be dealt with by the Sixth Form team.</p> <p>General poor attendance will always be dealt with by the Sixth Form team, student attendance should be no lower than 95% and is monitored on a weekly basis. If a student's figure falls below 90% the following protocol will be followed:</p>

	<p>If there are no extenuating circumstances, the following procedure will be followed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stage 1: Tutor to discusses issue with student and provides feedback to HoY. This will be recorded on Bromcom. • Stage 2: Phone Call to parents by tutor. Inform HoY. This will be recorded on Bromcom • Stage 3: Formal meeting with student and HoY with minutes taken and recorded on Bromcom • Stage 4: Formal meeting with student, parents and HoY. A student agreement will be issued, addressing concerns specific to that particular student. Recorded on Bromcom • Stage 5: If a student cannot adhere to the student agreement, their position in Post 16 to be considered. <p>It is crucial that you are on time for all registration periods and lessons, if you are persistently late without valid reason these concerns will be addressed as above.</p> <p>In Year 13, attendance privileges will be awarded to those who have demonstrated an excellent attendance record and work ethic throughout year 12. These privileges will allow students to arrive to school later in the day if their first lesson is not P1, and leave earlier in the day if their last lesson of the day is before P5. This privilege will be awarded at the discretion of Heads of Year and is not a student right. This will be monitored on a half termly basis and can be revoked at any time. Students will be notified if they have gained this privilege.</p>
Holidays	<p>Your time in the sixth form is remarkably short, every lesson matters! We cannot emphasize enough our view that time taken out for holidays at any stage of the year has a detrimental effect on student progress and we do not view requests of this sort lightly.</p> <p>No holidays should be taken during the Summer term as both Year 12 and 13 students will be undertaking formal examinations and rigorous assessments. For Year 13, the result of these will impact their Post 18 choices and for Year 12, these will contribute towards their progression into Year 13, which is not automatic but dependent on results of these examinations and assessments.</p> <p>Where it is absolutely unavoidable for a family to take a holiday in term time, a holiday form must be obtained from Mrs Heartfield and the request made at least one month in advance of the holiday. Students will be expected to liaise with teachers to catch up on any work missed as a result of taking a holiday in term time.</p>

Student Underperformance	<p>During your time in Sixth Form, it is vital that you are maximising all of the opportunities that are on offer to ensure you gain the most successful outcomes at the end of your time with us. This means full participation in all academic and extracurricular activities and consistently exhibiting the appropriate attitude to your studies.</p> <p>Under performance can include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Constant under performance in tests. • Poor attendance and Punctuality. • Missing deadlines. • Failing to complete independent tasks. • Behaviour that falls below the standard required. • Failure to follow the mobile phone policy • Failure to follow the guidance on parking in the school carpark. • Failure to wear your lanyard • Failure to adhere to the dress code • Failing to follow the school IT policy • Any other cause for concern as indicated by staff. <p>If any of the above occurs the following procedure will be taken and enforced. Subject issues will be dealt with departmentally, more general issues will be addressed by tutors and the Sixth Form team.</p> <p>After each step there will be a review and feedback of effectiveness (by relevant member of staff / Head of Department) which will be passed to MW/LH. This will allow us to keep relevant logs and monitor performance.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stage 1: Tutor/Teacher to discusses issue with student and provides feedback to HoY. This will be recorded on Bromcom. • Stage 2: Phone Call to parents by tutor/teacher. Inform HoY. This will be recorded on Bromcom • Stage 3: Formal meeting with student, teacher/tutor and HoY with minutes taken and recorded on Bromcom • Stage 4: Formal meeting with student, parents and HoY. Teacher/tutor will also be invited. A student agreement will be issued, addressing concerns specific to that particular student. Recorded on Bromcom • Stage 5: If a student cannot adhere to the student agreement, their position in Post 16 to be considered.
Coursework and Classwork	<p>Coursework and classwork are essential parts of your courses. Engagement in lessons is vitally important and students should ensure that when in lesson they are actively participating by asking</p>

	<p>questions, taking part in group work, completing set tasks, asking for help etc.</p> <p>For some courses, coursework makes a significant contribution to the final grade you receive. With the support and guidance of your subject teachers, students should complete all coursework and assignments to the best of their ability and in accordance with deadlines.</p>
Independent study	<p>Level Three study differs from any of the studying you have done thus far, in that there is a greater emphasis on you taking responsibility for your own learning. Of course, subject teachers will provide you with the knowledge and understanding needed to achieve your qualifications and always be on hand to offer additional support, but the most successful students are always those who quickly learn to organise and manage their studies outside of the classroom</p> <p>All students will be provided with a programme of study for their individual courses that will provide tasks for Directed Independent Learning (DIL).</p> <p>Some Key Tips for successful Level Three study:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Plan ahead. Get used to organising your time from the start, create a timetable to help with homework and revision. • Deal with difficulties as they arise, discuss them with your teacher/tutor as soon as you can and do not leave them until after a piece of work is expected to be completed. • Use a diary- Make a note of deadlines and any work that you need to complete. • Catch up with any work you have missed as soon as possible. • Plan effectively use of non-contact periods to maximise effective learning • For every hour spent in a lesson, it is advised that you spend at least an hour outside of lesson working on that subject.
Assessment	<p>Regular assessments of your progress and commitment to your studies takes place throughout your time in the Sixth Form. An initial assessment of progress will be carried out by subject teachers after students have completed the first six weeks of their chosen courses. The results will be fed back to Mrs Heartfield and Mr West, if there are any concerns raised at this time, these will be addressed with students on an individual level.</p> <p>Assessment data is gathered in each term of the academic year through classroom based assessments and mock examinations in January and June and will be sent home to parents/carers, as well as being viewed by Mrs Heartfield, Mr West and your tutors. This will be an important check on your progress and will highlight any</p>

	<p>concerns. During this process you will set individual targets to aid your progress.</p> <p>Your progress on Level three courses is matched against your GCSE/KS4 average point score. This is then compared with the national outcomes of similar students who studied the subject over the last 3 years. This provides a VA (value added) Score which considers your progress against similar students nationally with the same KS4 APS.</p>
Subject Choices and Changes	<p>The process by which you have chosen your courses for this year has been a long and thorough one, however, we are well aware that for some of you, there may be a valid reason for needing to change subjects.</p> <p>Within the first two weeks of the year, changing subjects is possible but you will be expected to justify your reasons for making the change and catch up with any work you have missed. It is not possible to change subjects at a later stage in the year due to the amount of subject content that will have already been delivered, however, we are always happy to discuss your options. It is possible for students taking four subjects to drop a subject and continue to study three but this will need to be discussed with Mrs Heartfield or Mr West.</p> <p>All year 12 students' subject choices will be reviewed at the end of year 12 to assess suitability for year 13 study.</p> <p>What should you do if you feel a change is necessary?</p> <p>It is important to give your original subject choices time as the transition to Sixth Form study is not instant and it will take a period of adjustment for all students. If you are unhappy after a few weeks, arrange a meeting with Mrs Heartfield or Mr West to discuss alternative options. It is important to remember that for some students, subject choices can affect your progression beyond your time at Quarrydale, therefore, these decision should be given careful consideration.</p>
Parent/Carer and Teacher Consultation Evenings	<p>At the beginning of the academic year there will be a welcome meeting for Year 12 students and their parents/carers which will provide an overview of what can be expected of students in Post 16 and the policies and processes that we use in the daily running of Post 16.</p> <p>Parents/Carer consultation evening will occur once during the academic year for year 12 and 13 students. Dates will be provided within the academic calendar at the start of the year and information will be available on the school website.</p>

	<p>The purpose of the evening is to let parents know how students have settled into the sixth form, the progress you are making, discuss your commitment and potential and to build the partnership between us. It is vital to involve students in the discussion and you are therefore expected to come along too.</p>
Exam Entries	<p>Exam entries are paid for by the school for all subjects taken as part of a student's timetable. However, where students' level of commitment is consistently below that expected by the sixth form, you may be withdrawn from the examination and therefore unable to complete your qualification.</p>
Paid Work	<p>Some students will take on a part-time job (evenings or weekends) during their time in the sixth form. Whilst this brings financial rewards and a valuable insight into the world of work, it does come with a warning! Courses post-16 are demanding and require consistent effort and application. If you are applying for part-time employment, you must avoid excessive or late hours. Your priority must be your academic work – the next two years is your chance to prove yourself! You should be aware from the outset that all the research shows that students who work more than 10 hours per week do not do as well as those who keep a sense of balance.</p>
Driving and Car Parking	<p>During your time in Sixth Form, many of you will pass your driving tests. If you intend on bringing a car onto the school site you must provide details of your car to Mr West or Mrs Heartfield to allow us to identify the vehicle if necessary.</p> <p>You must drive with due care and attention whilst on or around the school site. There is a 5mph speed limit when driving on school grounds which must be adhered to for the safety of all students and staff. Students may park in the back carpark which is accessible by pressing the 'call' button to alert reception, who will open the gate. Under no circumstances should students park in the front car park.</p>
Communication	<p>Once students enter Post 16, they will almost always be the first point of contact when passing on information so please make sure that parents/carers regularly check in with students for any updates.</p> <p>Information, messages and notices will be circulated to students via their school email account wherever possible. Students are therefore advised to check their email account on a regular basis. The facility to link your school email account to a personal mobile phone is available. Further guidance regarding this process, is available from the IT team.</p> <p>In some instances, important information will be sent home in letters which will be distributed to students by their tutors. The</p>

	<p>Academy also uses An online system to notify parents/carers of key dates and information via text and email so please ensure the Academy have up to date contact details.</p> <p>There are also regular updates on the Academy website and the Academy's Facebook page.</p>

The programme includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A range of sessions over two years at the host university, covering a diverse range of topics including choosing and applying to a university, CV and interview techniques, subject-specific revision sessions and workshops on different areas of the law E-mentoring from undergraduate law students, provided through the Brightside Trust Work experience in the legal sector, at leading law firms, chambers, regional firms and non-profit organisations such as legal advice centres A residential conference in the summer between years 12 and 13 to give students a taste of life at university and to take part in a range of workshops, debates and lectures Pathways to STEM- Aimed at students interested in a STEEM career, the programme is run in partnership with the University of Nottingham. The Brilliant Club- The Scholars Programme	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Brilliant Club exists to widen access to highly-selective universities for pupils from under-represented groups. • The programme helps to develop student's research, analytical, evaluation and academic writing skills, all of which are needed for successful higher education study and are skills that universities are looking for applicants to possess. • As part of the programme, PhD tutors deliver a number of university-style tutorials to small groups of pupils, who then go on to complete a dissertation style assignment. • The assignment is then graded as a university piece of work would be and students are invited to take part in a graduation ceremony at a university. • The programme usually runs in the Autumn term and in recent years has focused on the areas of STEM and humanities subjects.
Summer Schools	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In addition to the Summer Schools programme that is provided by The Sutton Trust, many universities across the country offer students the opportunity to experience university life as part of their Summer residential programmes. • University websites will contain all of the information that you need to be able to apply for a programme, applications for Summer Schools usually open in January. • In previous years, students from the Sixth Form have attended Summer School at Northumbria University, The University of Nottingham and Durham University.
The Social Mobility Foundation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Social Mobility Foundation (SMF) is a charity which aims to improve social mobility for young people from low-income and underprivileged areas. • They provide opportunities and networks of support for 16-17 year olds who would like to progress to higher education. • The areas that they focus on are: Accountancy, Architecture, Banking & Finance, Biology & Chemistry, Business, Engineering & Physics, Law, Media & Communications, Medicine, Politics, and Technology.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> They run many programmes and Summer Schools with their partner universities which help to prepare students for university and to secure the offer of a place to study at degree level.
University Open Days	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> If you are planning to go to university it is important that you attend as many open days as possible. Open days allow you to gather information about the university, the facilities and accommodation. They also allow you to get a feel for the teaching style, atmosphere and location of a university. We will be visiting the following universities for open days throughout the year: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The University of Nottingham Nottingham Trent University The University of Derby Lincoln University In addition to these, you should also try to attend open days at other universities that you may be considering. If a group of students express an interest in visiting a university further afield, it is possible that we can make arrangements for this to happen. Open day information, including dates and booking details can be found on university websites and is also displayed in the computer area upstairs.

These will include universities and other education providers, apprenticeship providers, industry providers, student finance, one of the major banks, charity organisations, unions and individuals from a variety of professions.

NCS- National Citizen Service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Many students may have completed a four week NCS programme at the end of year 11 and will no doubt have had a fantastic time! For those who did not get to take part in the experience, NCS are running an additional programme in October half term that you are able to apply for. NCS looks fantastic on CVs and UCAS applications and is recognised by universities. It allows you to develop a multitude of essential skills, to try new challenges and to meet new people. NCS representatives will be coming in to school to provide more information on the October half term programme.
Apprenticeships	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> For some students, university is not the only option that will be considered as a progression route after Sixth Form, and for many, apprenticeships are a great alternative. Throughout the next two years, particularly during year 13, we will work closely with West Notts College, Industry providers, ASK apprenticeships and many others to ensure that students wishing to apply for apprenticeships are supported and prepared for the application process. Information on the types of apprenticeships available and where to find them will also be available throughout the year.
Work Experience	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> For some students, work experience will be a requirement during your time in Post 16. This may be a requirement for some students studying Btec level three courses or may be needed for your university applications. Whatever the case, we will help you to secure relevant work experience. When applying to university, certain areas of study will require that you have done work experience, these include medicine, nursing, physiotherapy, teaching and social work. Ensure that you research what your course entry requirements are and plan accordingly.

The Derby and Nottinghamshire Collaborative Outreach Programme- DANCOP	<p>DANCOP is a government funded initiative founded to help students from socially deprived areas access Higher Education opportunities and overcome the barriers to educational progress. As a school and Sixth Form, we work closely with the various strands of the programme to support our students, helping them to develop knowledge and skills for the future.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Access Champions: One to one student mentoring with a progression specialist throughout year 12 and year 13. Support is provided to research progression routes, complete applications and provide advice and guidance on any other aspect related to post 18 progress. INTO University- The INTO University team work with students from Y9-Y13 on a wide range of areas, including the development of academic and employability skills, CV and application writing and support with Post 18 progress. They are able to provide students with the opportunity to visit universities, apprenticeship providers and employers and work with students in groups and on a one to one basis. DANCOP- This is the Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire strand of NCOP providing tailored support to schools in the area. They provide skill enhancement-based sessions, Knowledge building sessions, careers advice and guidance and a wide variety of trips and visits for students.

The Lessons from Auschwitz Project (LFA Project)	<p>Every year two students are selected to participate in the LFA project, a four part programme designed to increase and develop understanding of the holocaust and its lasting effect on humanity.</p> <p>Students must:</p> <p>Attend an initial orientation seminar</p> <p>Participate in a 24 hour visit to Poland where they visit Auschwitz.</p> <p>Attend a follow up seminar once the visit has taken place.</p> <p>Share their experiences with other students, increasing awareness of the Holocaust, through presentations/assemblies/reports etc.</p>
